To become a Precinct Election Official in Ohio:

- You must be at least 17 years of age and registered to vote
- You must be a registered voter in the county in which you plan to work as a P.E.O.
- You must not have been convicted of a felony
- You cannot be running as a candidate for the election in which you are working

Keep in mind:

- All P.E.O.s are required to attend a training session scheduled by your county board of elections prior to the election
- You can expect to work from about 5:30 a.m. (polls are open at 6:30) until 8:30 p.m. (polls close at 7:30), though working hours vary from county to county
